
We welcome our new Volunteer Coordinator

Unfortunately, that job was only temporary. Lizzy is seeking employment through MassHire and temporary agencies. By her own admission she lacked skills to budget and save money. She has been improving with this and contributes to her savings regularly. She is motivated by wanting to support herself. She is focused on seeking housing and continues to seek work. Meanwhile, she has begun high school courses online. LIzzy is very excited about earning her diploma.

By way of introduction my name is Pastor Dan Purtell, Pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Sturbridge and member of the Board of Directors of Friends of St. Luke's, Inc. I wanted to take a moment and share a little bit about why I serve on the Board and why the ministry of St. Luke's is so critical for our community.



During Lent I have been participating in an online Lenten study sponsored by the New England Synod. During one of those meetings, the following question was raised: "How can we get into the world, so God's people can thrive?"

I think this question lifts up one reason why I'm on the Board. We know the world that we live in is a broken place for far too many people. We see that in Southbridge and our surrounding communities every day. Far too many people struggle to find shelter and a place to call home.



I have been drawn to serve at St. Luke's because it not only provides shelter for those without housing, but it also extends that mission to equipping our beloved siblings by providing

assistance in money management skills and providing connection to community resources and other opportunities, including the Finding Hope Program. It is not enough to help folks survive; we want to ensure folks are able to thrive when they leave the Guesthouse. Everyone deserves that, and that is primarily why I'm on the board--so that we can ensure this good and holy work continues to provide these opportunities.

A View from the Staff

Recently we at St. Luke's have been engaged in discussion about the challenges that many are facing with housing. Rents continue to increase, as do landlords' expectations. With so many seeking sustainable housing, landlords are inundated with applicants. Many of our guests have poor housing and/or credit histories. While there are agencies that offer assistance for move-in costs, monthly fulfillment is a concern. Landlords, too, need to be able to meet their costs.

The other issue we are seeing is the increase of the immigrant population in our area and services they need. Many of those coming to the United States do not realize that they must go through a lengthy process for work permits, identifications and more. Not having these items impedes their ability to find housing as well as employment. The agencies working to assist these individuals are overwhelmed. We at St. Luke's have been discussing our role in the community and how we can best serve this population as they seek our help,

News from the Guesthouse

In January we provided 290 nights of shelter and case management for 7 families.

- In February we provided 319 nights of shelter and case management for 7 families.
- At the beginning of March we had 14 guests (7 families) at the Guesthouse. This includes two young mothers with 10-month-olds, a single father with a 4 and a 5-year-old, and an immigrant family of three. All 7 families are seeking affordable housing despite the severe housing shortage and rising cost of housing. We live in Hope!

Finding Hope/Preventing Eviction

Many families are struggling financially, behind on their rent and at risk of losing their homes. Finding HOPE/ Preventing Eviction is an outreach program of Friends of St. Luke's that provides the support necessary to prevent an individual or a family from being evicted. We currently have openings for the Finding HOPE program. If you or someone you know is behind on their rent or bills call us at 774-230-6416 to see if you might qualify to join the program.

What Is St. Luke's Guesthouse?

Founded in 2017, St. Luke's is the only homeless shelter serving single men, women, and families in the fifteen towns of southern Worcester County. St. Luke's receives no government funding and operates thanks to the generosity of local donors, churches, and grants from local businesses, United Way of South-Central Mass, The Greater Worcester Community Foundation, Spectrum Health Systems, The Wagner Foundation, and St. Vincent's Healthcare Fund. We also collaborate with other local organizations in our community to serve families in need.
