A Message from the President

Dear Families, Friends, and Supporters,

Sometimes we are inundated with requests for shelter from people living in cars or couch surfing, and for funds to pay for emergency accommodation, rent, or utility bills. St Luke's Guesthouse is a small temporary shelter with beds for just 12 adults and children and with cribs for 2 babies. Our commitment to breaking the cycle of homelessness in southern Worcester County is guided by our mission statement (to provide short term sheltering and to support empowerment for guests to achieve self-sufficiency) and by our vision (that all persons who are homeless in southern Worcester Conty would have a place to experience Christian hospitality and empowerment to achieve self-sufficiency).

We strive to help whenever we can, BUT sometimes, we have to say no. When this happens, I remember the 5th grade D.A.R.E Program graduation speech I first heard 28 years ago: Onlookers from the promenade in a coastal town watch a young child on a vast beach littered with stranded starfish as the tide recedes. The child picks up a stranded starfish and carefully places it in a small bucket and continues along the shore, picking up one starfish at a time. When the bucket is full, the child walks into the sea and empties the starfish into the water. He then returns to collect more starfish and puts those into the sea. After a while a person walks up to the child and asks "Why are you bothering to collect starfish? There are so many that you cannot possibly make a difference!" The child holds up one starfish and says, "I have made all the difference to this starfish." He picks up another and says "and all the difference to this starfish. And if everyone watching would join me, we could save a lot more."

St. Luke's cannot help everyone in need of shelter, BUT we strive to help as many as we can. The Guesthouse offers a warm, dry safe space and a mailing address that provides stability, allows children to succeed in school, and improves mental and physical health. Housing First is the initial step out of poverty. We are able to do this because of the support of our

A Family's Story

The Guesthouse is working with a family of four. The husband and wife both work full time. "Dick and Jane" (not their real names) lost their apartment after falling behind in bills due to Dick's medical issues. When they contacted us, they were living in their car with their two children, ages 13 and 9. Dick has diabetes and was very sick. Upon their arrival in July, Dick was almost immediately hospitalized due to blood clots/stroke. He has been in the hospital several times and needs treatment for a heart condition. Their main concern was to be able to have a place for Dick to stabilize, allow time to save money, and find housing. Jane has continued to work full time. While we are not sure how long they will stay at the Guesthouse, they are grateful that we have been working with them. The children are attending school in Dudley, their hometown.

News from the Guesthouse

For the months of June, July and August we provided 807 nights of shelter and case management for 20 men, women and children ages 13 months to 64 years.

Over the 3 months, 4 families found other housing and left the Guesthouse. At the beginning of September, we have 9 guests with 2 more anticipated.

One family is waiting for acceptance into housing.

Finding Hope/Preventing Eviction

Founded in 2017, St. Luke's is the only homeless shelter serving single men, women, and families in fourteen towns of southern Worcester County.
